Assessment Details

Assessment 1: Critical Writing Task

Start date:

Length: 750 words

Details: Students will write a short critical reflection (750 words) on a key development. Students will receive individual written feedback and a number of days of submission. Students will also receive cohort feedback in class.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism
