## Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without attribution.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

**Copying:** using the same or very similar words to the original text or image, or source or using quotation marks. This also applies to images, art and presentations where someone presents another's ideas or words without attribution.

**Inappropriate paraphrasing:** Changing a few words and phrases while retaining the structure and/or progression of ideas of the original, and information applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without attribution by piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate attribution.

**Collusion:** working with others but passing off the work as a person's own includes providing your work to another student before the due date, or plagiarising at any time, paying another person to perform an academic task, giving another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete a task in exchange for payment for completing academic work.

**Inappropriate citation:** Citing sources which have not been read, without giving the source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

**Duplication ("self-plagiarism"):** submitting your own work, in whole or in part, that has been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW.

Correct referencing practices:

- Paraphrasing, summarising, essay writing and time management
- Appropriate use of and attribution for a range of materials including concepts.

Individual assistance is available on request from The Learning Centre. Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important factor in identifying causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should focus on research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assignments.
